It was Friday, March 13, 2020, and I was on my way to my student pulpit to celebrate Purim when I heard on the radio that the COVID-19 pandemic was officially declared a national emergency. The empty shelves at Market Basket and the urgent feeling that I should have hand sanitizer with me at all times was an indication that life as we knew it had gone topsy-turvy.

For our Temple Beth Am community, that Purim would be the last in-person holiday celebration for more than a year, and for two

years now we have dealt with countless "new normals," with a multitude of unknowns and anxieties. But in these last two years we have witnessed ingenuity and creativity in the ways we gather, we have built on the power of this wonderful community, and we have seen the triumph of spirit together.

Chapter 9 of the Book of Esther opens by telling us that on the thirteenth day of Adar, the day the Jews of Shushan were to be annihilated by the king's decree, "V'nahafoch hu"—the opposite happened! On the contrary, it was the other inhabitants of Shushan who feared Mordecai and the Jewish people. Those whose lives were threatened in one moment found themselves empowered the next. Perhaps we too over the last two years have felt that topsy-turvy nature of life, from tragedy in one moment to triumph the next. One constant in our people's history is that nothing is constant; so much can change from one minute to the next.

And we make the best of it! As the pandemic becomes endemic, our community is busier than ever, offering programs with our Lizkor: To Remember initiative, learning and classes for all ages and stages, and most of all celebrating Jewish life together. Purim is all about joy, about leaning in to the ups and downs that life throws our way as we embrace each day and one another with fullness and acceptance.

Join us this month as we learn about and celebrate Purim with Jewish text, with laughter, with music, and of course, with no small amount of silliness! May we find strength, comfort, and joy together as

years; we no longer list the names of clergy, temple president or bnei mitzvah families on the outdoor message board; the local Framingham police drive through our parking lot many times, day and night, often stopping to do paperwork in our lot; armed private security guards are hired when large crowds are expected; and much more. Thanks to a grant from the CJP, we are installing additional cameras around the back of our building.

We Jews have learned again and again that the cost of our freedom to practice our religion is not free. Whether it's Colleyville, or Poway or Pittsburgh or any of dozens more examples, from outright murders, to hostage-taking, to graffiti. The attention of Temple Presidents and their Boards often focuses on how to fund and install all of the changes that might fortify buildings and members against the next Haman – and it seems there will always be another.

The Anti-Defamation League reports an historic high number of anti-Semitic incidents this year, so it is not our imaginations that are telling us that they are more frequent, more brazen, and more frightening all over the world. The ADL estimates that this past year, over 60% of Jews witnessed behavior or comments that they deemed anti-Semitic. For example, on just one day, January, 30, 2022, there were incidents reported in Tucson, Orlando, Seattle, Brooklyn and Chicago, ranging from bomb threats, to graffiti to verbal assaults. Doubtless there were more — just not reported.

If you read our weekly emails or Tebeam, you will see that we list a series of webinars, roundtables, and presentations offering instruction and information on everything from how to reply to anti-Semitic remarks to how to escape from an active shooter, offered by the Jewish Federation, Combined Jewish Philanthropies, or the Synagogue Council, and others. Also, we are about to start a TBA Safety and Security Committee (let me know if you would like to help) to decide and prioritize what we need to do to make our synagogue safer. Our first security class will take place on the evening of March 3, in the Social Hall.

Please sign up for these opportunities and join me and our Board in our effort to keep TBA and its members safer. It is our responsibility to each other.

Purim: Is It for Kids or Adults?

We often think of Purim as a Jewish holiday for children. On Purim, we wear costumes and boo after hearing the name of the infamous Purim villain, Haman (boo!). We sing silly songs, like "oh once there was a wicked, wicked man, and Haman was his name..." In our Temple Beth Am religious school, we will celebrate Purim with a Purim carnival. **This year's Purim carnival will take place at 11:00 AM on Sunday, March 20,** and will feature a DJ and fun carnival games. And for the entire TBA community, we will tell the Purim story through a wacky Purim spiel and *Megilla* reading. **In this year's Purim spiel**,

which will take place the evening of Wednesday, March 16, we will tell the Purim story through 4 unusual mini-spiels: as a country-western, as a conversation between two yiddish-speakers in Brooklyn, as a text conversation between two teenagers, and as a live, breaking newscast. Both of these events will be fun, slightly wacky, and family-friendly.


While Purim seems to be a children's holiday, Jewish tradition makes space for adults too. The ancient rabbis of the Talmud wrote that "עקרור המן לברור המן לברור המן לברור המן לברור המן לברור המן לברור *l'vasomei b'purya ad d'la yada bein arur Haman l'baruch Mordechai*" (Talmud, Megilla 7b). If this Hebrew looks and sounds odd, that's because it is not Hebrew; it is Aramaic! The rabbis wrote, "a person is obligated to become intoxicated on Purim until they are so intoxicated that they cannot distinguish between cursed Haman and blessed Mordecai." It would seem very difficult to confuse Haman and Mordechai. To make this a more reachable goal, there is often a great deal of alcohol at a traditional Purim celebration!

Despite all of the silliness of Purim traditions and celebrations, the Purim story is quite frightening. The Jewish people of Persia are nearly destroyed, like in so many chapters of Jewish history. Why, then, do the rabbis of the Talmud teach us to drink wine and act silly? Whereas so many Jewish holidays are times for spiritual introspection, Purim is a time to let loose. Historically, Jewish communities, often faced with hardship, looked forward to Purim as a time to release tension. The silliness of Purim celebration is a response to the seriousness of the Purim story, and the many trying chapers in Jewish history. Sometimes, we all need to laugh!



Even today, the wackiness of Purim can hold special meaning for us. Purim invites us to feel and behave differently in a synagogue setting. While Purim is still a holy day, we (and the ancient rabbis) give ourselves license to embrace our inner child, wear a costume, and act silly. Living through a pandemic the last two years has been challenging in so many ways. Purim gives us an opportunity to laugh and let loose as a Jewish community. This year, I invite everyone to get silly, and join us for Purim the evening of Wednesday, March 16!

LIZKOR: TO REMEMBER

Temple Beth Am's Lizkor project, established to help retain memories of the Holocaust, presented two wonderful speakers in recent weeks, and both were recorded and can be viewed on request through the Temple Office.

Rena Finder spoke on January 27, and told the story of being hidden as a young child for much of World War 2. She wrote a book, intended for children, because it is the children who must carry the story forward into succeeding generations.





On February 7, TBA member **George Clymas** told his story of being hidden by family friends in Budapest, and

hiding again in the Buda hills outside Budapest, finally arriving in the United States after the war ended. George's program included questions, many from our high school students who have been studying the Holocaust.

We are fortunate to have been able to provide eye-witness accounts of the Holocaust and we sincerely thank both Rena and George for sharing their painful experiences with us.


