#### COUNTING UP > COUNTING DOWN

"By the time I count down from 10, I expect all these toys to be back in the basket. 10...9...8..." If you have kids in your life, this sort of countdown may sound familiar. And while counting down can be useful for say, the launch of a rocket or a cleanup ultimatum, we find ourselves now in the part of the Jewish year where we count UP, not down. This period called the Omer (עומר) has its roots in the Book of Leviticus, where the Israelites are told to bring a barley offering on the second day of Passover, at the very

beginning of the harvest season. We are then told to count up each day for seven weeks, and on the fiftieth day the Torah directs us to bring an offering of bread from the fresh wheat crop. The time of the Omer during the harvest season was a time of trepidation, of fervent prayer, of hope—would the crops yield enough to sustain the people this year? Would it be a time of bounty, or a time of scarcity?

Later, the rabbis associated this time period with another Passover-related memory. These 49 days of counting became a reminder of the time between freedom from slavery in Egypt until the receiving of the Torah on Mount Sinai, which occurred on Shavuot, the fiftieth day after God took us out from Pharaoh's servitude. Leaving Egypt in haste after 400 years of slavery meant that the Israelites would need to undergo a period of spiritual and communal refinement; these 49 days were an opportunity for reflection and improvement so that our ancestors could be in a state where they were ready to receive the holy Torah with all its sacred obligations and commandments, putting us into eternal relationship with God.

The Kabbalists expanded on this notion of personal growth during the Omer, linking seven of the ten *sefirot* (קְפִירוֹת), or manifestations of God, with each day and week of the Omer, such that each day becomes a meditation on the ways in which two of those manifestations interact

with one another. For example, on May 1<sup>st</sup>, the 15<sup>th</sup> day of the Omer, we focus on *chesed shebetiferet* (חֶסֶד שֶׁבִּתְפִּירֶת), or lovingkindness within compassion, where we might examine the ways our compassion comes across to others. Is it sincere? Do my intentions match the way my actions are perceived by my friends and family? By taking time each day to count up and to scrutinize our own presence in the world, we prepare and refine ourselves, little by little, until that fiftieth day, Shavuot, on which we imagine receiving the Torah anew each year.

Counting up during this period of the Omer offers excitement, unlimited potential, and an opportunity for personal advancement that cannot be contained by a countdown. I hope you'll join me in using this time to think about our own role in the world—how we treat ourselves, how we interact with others, and how we place ourselves within the larger framework of our community and society. As we imagine ourselves reenacting our ancestors' journey from slavery to freedom to the acceptance of the Torah, may we continue to become the very best version of ourselves. Because when you count up, there is no end; there is only infinite possibility!

## ISRAEL DAY IN THE TBA RELIGIOUS SCHOOL: CELEBRATING OUR LOVE FOR ISRAEL!

Every spring in Israel, on the 4<sup>th</sup> and 5<sup>th</sup> of Iyar in the Hebrew calendar, Israelis observe a two day holiday. The first day, beginning in the evening (like all Jewish holidays) is Yom HaZikaron (יום הזכרון), Israeli Memorial Day, a solemn day to remember the fallen soldiers of the Israeli army. That evening, a siren is heard across all of Israel for 1 minute. During that 1 minute, life stops. Drivers on the highway get out of their cars. People pause in the middle of their conversations. For 1 minute, the lives of all Israelis stop; it is a striking experience to behold, and one that I will never forget.

The next evening, the solemnity of Yom HaZikaron gives way to the joy of Yom HaAtzmaut (יום העצמאות), Israeli Independence Day. Concerts and fireworks take place in town squares across the country. Streets are closed to cars as people sing and dance in the streets. It is not quite the same flavor as July 4<sup>th</sup> in America; the joy of Yom HaAtzmaut is something ecstatic and exciting, a time for Israel to celebrate its existence. It is pure joy, another experience that I will never forget.

This year, Yom HaZikaron begins the evening of Tuesday, May 3, giving way to Yom HaAtzmaut the evening of Wednesday May 4, which ends at sundown on Thursday, May 5. **On Wednesday, May 4 this year, the TBA lower religious school will celebrate Israeli Independence Day (יום העצמאות – Yom HaAtzmaut) with an Israel Day celebration.**

The TBA garden (גן העם – Gan HaAm) will be decorated with festive Israeli flags. The students will learn traditional Israeli dances. Students will create their own embroidered Israeli flags, and learn about modern Israel. We will face the Israeli flag, and observe our own moment of silence, just as Israelis do. And we will sing HaTikvah (התקווה),



the Israeli national anthem, singing of hope for a bright and peaceful future for Israel. Finally, thanks to TBA brotherhood, our religious school will be visited by the famous Kona Shave Ice truck! Of course, In Israel, shave ice is called Barad (ברד), literally “hail”, and is more like a slushee or a slurpee, a cold beverage typically enjoyed on the beach. But Hawaii is very far from Israel, so we are quite free to enjoy delicious Hawaiian shave ice in Framingham, Massachusetts.

I lived in Tel Aviv, Israel, for two years, shortly after college, and it was one of many experiences that led me to the cantorate. I fell in love with the Hebrew language and with Israeli culture. I hope that all of our students have the opportunity to visit Israel; it is an experience every Jewish person should have. In fact, TBA and CJP can help reduce the cost of student trips to Israel – ask me (Cantor Wolff) for more information! I want to wish everyone in our TBA community a meaningful Yom HaZikaron, and a joyous Yom HaAtzmaut!



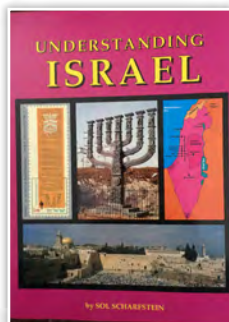

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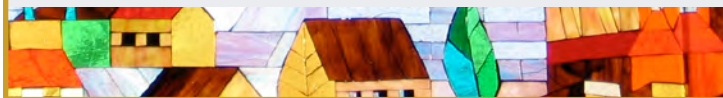
