## THE POWER **OF RITUAL**

I wish I could describe the feeling I had when I looked out into the sanctuary at the end of each of our High Holiday services, as I saw our community members turn to one another with smiles, hugs, and handshakes, wishing one another a Shanah Tovah. Hearing a unison of voices in our sanctuary reading and singing together in Hebrew and English reminded me of something I knew to be true but hadn't felt so acutely since the beginning

of the pandemic: there is enormous power and blessing in taking part in ritual together as a community.

In the book Rituals for Our Times by Evan Imber-Black and Janine Roberts, the authors write about what they consider to be the



five purposes of ritual. First, they say, ritual is about **relating** with one another; it is about "shaping, expressing, and maintaining relationships." Through prayer and song, and even in the simple action of sitting near one another or seeing our community gathered on Zoom, we feel a part of something larger than ourselves when we assemble at the same time and in the same place. Knowing that hundreds of our community members were together to bring in year 5783 on the Jewish calendar brings us closer and makes our extended Jewish family feel that much more connected.

Next, ritual is about **changing**: it is a useful tool to make and mark transitions for ourselves and others. We often think of rituals that mark the biggest transitions in our lives: baby namings, B'nai Mitzvah, weddings. But what a joy it was to mark the transition into a New Jewish Year together, knowing that we have worked hard to make this year that has just begun the best year yet for ourselves and for our community. What an honor it was to mark some of our newest community members' transition to Judaism by inviting them to the Torah for the first time on Rosh Hashanah. Publicly marking major changes in our lives through ritual makes a transition more real and signals to others who we are and what we value.

The third purpose of ritual, according to Imber-Black and Roberts, is to aid in **healing**. Judaism is replete with healing rituals, from the Yizkor service to the Mi Sheberach prayer we sing together to pray for the health of family and friends. Healing rituals can help us make sense of contradictory feelings, they can help us recover from trauma and from loss, and they can be a mirror that shows us just how resilient and courageous each one of us is.

Ritual is also about **believing**. Ritual helps us voice our beliefs—personally and collectively—and it helps us to make meaning out of our life experiences and the world around us. Our High Holiday *machzor* (prayer book) with its poetry, liturgy, and readings helps us discern what we believe and what matters most to us. By virtue of having made the time and effort to participate in ritual together with our community, each of us implicitly expresses our belief that Jewish living is valuable and vital.

Last but certainly not least, ritual is about **celebrating**. We feed off one another's energy when we engage in rituals

that affirm the beauty and joy of what it means to be alive. This is the essence of so much of Jewish ritual: gratitude that we are alive and that we have the ability to celebrate life's ups and downs in one another's presence. To quote the Shehecheyanu prayer, we give thanks to G-d for giving us life, for sustaining us, and for enabling us to reach each special moment in our lives.

The High Holidays are the peak time for ritual in the Jewish year. Now that they have come to a close, we invite you to stay engaged with our community year-round, so that we can experience together all the wonderful ways ritual can change us and the trajectory of our lives.

To a year of relating, changing, healing, believing, and celebrating as a *kehillah kedosha*—a holy community,

much-needed respite from our beautiful (but exhausting) holidays. So, there's some time to relax, right? Nope!

Three years ago, every time it rained, water rushed into the building in several places, but most dramatically into the foyer where it resembled Niagara Falls. No gentle dribble – it was torrents of water! Today, thanks to a new roof, we are dry – no more leaks anywhere!



The cost of the roof was well beyond the total amount in our Building Fund, even if you combined it with everything given to the Wall of Honor! So how did we manage it? Simple! We will pay for it in arrears. We traded profit from electricity to be generated by the solar installation, with no out-of-pocket from our Temple budget, to pay for the roof. The solar panels have been in place over our school wing for months, and are barely noticeable. The carport is noticeable, but in a good way.

No need to grab an umbrella when it's raining or snowing; the carport will offer protection for most parking slots.

We are nearing completion of the solar panel installation on the carport, although electrical wiring and drainage issues are not yet complete. Work on the





Social Hall and Sanctuary roofs will not include solar panels but will require structural repair – that will have to wait until winter is over.

When all is said and done, TBA will have done its part to save the planet. Our electricity will be generated by sunlight, which, by the way, is in keeping with our Jewish belief of "tikkun olam" or repair of the world. Our solar project is win-win, for us and for the entire planet.

From vision to execution to completion, this was a complicated project.

Many thanks to all those who helped make it a success. God created the world and gave us a special responsibility to guard and cultivate it, using it wisely. With this solar project, we have done so.

## What's Going On in the TBA Lower Religious School

With the many holidays of the Hebrew month of Tishrei behind us, our Temple Beth Am lower school students and teachers are able to get into a rhythm of teaching, learning, and having fun! Our lower school is comprised of grades K-7, with grades 3-6 attending religious school Sundays and Wednesdays, and grades K-2 and 7 attending school on Sundays only. Our students study Hebrew, Jewish holidays, Jewish history, Torah, and so much more! Below are some highlights of activities happening in our school this past month.

Our youngest students, in Kinder-

garten-2<sup>nd</sup> grade, are working hard learning the Hebrew letters. As any adult learner can attest, learning the Hebrew alphabet is not easy! Hebrew uses an alphabet entirely different from English; consonants are represented by letters, while vowels are represented by dots and symbols above and below the letters. The Hebrew alphabet includes sounds that don't even exist in the English alphabet (silent letters like y-ayin and x-aleph, sounds like ts for y-tzadi, and of course ch, like a person clearing their throat, for n-chet and y-chaf). Despite all of these challenges, our youngest students are having great success learning their letters! We encourage the students to be creative with letter study; see the picture above with the letter 2-bet, painted in watercolor!

Our  $3^{rd}$ - $5^{th}$  grade class has also been engaged in hands-on learning, creating 3-D works of art to tell the story of the opening of Bereishit,



the 7 days of creation (see the picture on left). After creating their representation of creation, students addressed a difficult question: how can we understand both the creation story in the Torah, and what we have learned about evolution and the big bang in science class? Students wrestled with the question, and agreed

that there are different kinds of truth, that science and religion are different, and that the two don't have to agree.

Our 6<sup>th</sup> grade class returned to our TBA Sukkah and did some critical thinking, trying to determine if our Sukkah was up to code (the code of Jewish law, of course). The students reviewed some of the traditional requirements for a Sukkah (sturdy enough to withstand an ordinary gust of wind, with a roof covered by enough boughs as to have more shade than sun, and not erected underneath the branches of a tree). They decided that, as best we could in the TBA garden, our Sukkah was up to code.

Our 7<sup>th</sup> grade class has been studying the yearly cycle of Torah readings. They asked themselves, why do we read the same stories, every year? And why, on Simchat Torah, do we finish the Torah, and then immediately begin the Torah again? These are big questions, without any single correct answer. As our 7<sup>th</sup> grade students discuss, research, and learn, they begin to better understand why they are reading Torah for their upcoming Bar/Bat Mitzvah.

The learning, creativity, and fun continues in the TBA religious school. And we are growing, with new families joining us each of the past two years! 




