Just yesterday Cantor Wolff and I, along with many TBA members, were at Temple Shir Tikva in Wayland to stand with over 350 others from the Jewish, interfaith, and greater community to say that hate and antisemitism have no place in Wayland, in Metrowest, or in our world after the insidious symbol of hatred itself, the swastika, was found painted on a road in Wayland last week.

We are all aware of the sudden and sharp rise of antisemitism our worldwide Jewish

community has faced in recent weeks, in the wake of Israel's ongoing war with Hamas. It pains me to know that so many of us in the Jewish community, myself included, are grappling with our own questions: Is it safe to leave the mezuzah up on my door in my apartment building?

Can I put a "We Stand With Israel" sign on my lawn without fear of vandalism or theft? Should I share my real feelings about this war with my colleagues?

I've always wanted to see Judaism and Jewish living as an exercise of light. To live the rhythms of Jewish life means to appreciate the joy, the beauty, and the warmth of what it means to live in community, to be part of a conversation that spans generations, and to connect with a Power which is beyond us. In times like these, that light can be difficult to harness and hold on to.

But the holiday of Chanukah, which begins on the evening of December 7, reminds us that we have a choice: we can allow the darkness to cause us to retreat, to sink into ourselves; or we can have the courage to light the candle, to bring more holiness into the world, and to proudly display our light for all to see.

I often think of the famous black-and-white photograph of a menorah lit on a windowsill facing the street in 1931 Germany, where outside a Nazi flag is hanging on a nearby building. This picture is a reminder that our people have lived through so much, and despite the pain, despite the persecution, and despite the darkness, we have found the courage time and time again to kindle light. We have chosen, no matter the circumstances,



to share the splendor of Jewish living, through all times and all ages.

Part of the mitzvah of lighting the Chanukah candles includes displaying the lit candles for all to see. This Chanukah, may we be proud to shine our light, and may we, in the words of the prophet Isaiah, be "a light unto the nations."

The first essay Alex emailed to me was about his regret at not having been old enough to discuss the Holocaust with his great-grandmother, Paula, before she passed away. Not too long ago, he was able to watch and listen to her testimony to The Shoah Foundation, a project of Steven Spielberg, but he would have liked to have been able to question her, to better understand the gradual overtaking of the Jews of her village in Poland, until they were gone to the concentration camps, most never to return.

I was startled that my first reaction to his essay was whether it would hurt or help him getting into college, to reveal at the outset that he was Jewish. I did not feel the need to correct his writing. His choice of topic warmed my Jewish bubbe's heart. Nevertheless, my fear that antisemitism would negatively impact his chance of acceptance to a college and even beyond overtook all of that.

Why was that my first reaction? At this writing, the horrible events of October 7 in Israel are six weeks old, and yet I was surprised that my own thought process had been so affected. But then again, maybe I have been feeling the tension of antisemitism for a whole lot longer than six weeks.

We all watched on TV as other synagogues around the country endured attacks whose likely cause was antisemitism. Last spring at TBA, our Board of Trustees debated whether or not to create a fund to be used

for security purposes. For a few years, we had already hired armed security for the High Holidays, and perhaps should do so more often. While we did not add the Security Fund last June, we named Simms Pearl as a Board chair for Security and Antisemitism.

A few months have passed since that June Board meeting, and then the vicious attack on Israel killed 1,400 or more people on October 7, 2023. There is no longer any question that it is now time to face the need for additional security at TBA. As you are aware, we recently added an initial surcharge for security to all members' bills that will cover our expenses for now. The members of our Board of Trustees feel the responsibility of making Temple Beth Am a safe haven for its members, staff, teachers, clergy, and all who enter its doors. With Simms's help, and the financial wherewithal provided by our membership, we are making plans to do that under the oversight of a newly formed Security Committee.

Thank you for helping keep our TBA community safe. I know that you will join me in hoping that Alex reaches his goal at his #1 choice college and that the world we leave to our children and grandchildren is filled with love, hope, and acceptance.

Miracles, Chanukah, and Finding Hope

Chanukah is the festival of lights, a celebration of Jewish history, and a time to show gratitude to those we love. It is also a celebration of miracles. Against overwhelming odds, the Maccabees defeated the Greek army, regaining control of the Holy Temple in Jerusalem. Upon regaining control of the Temple, the Maccabees found enough oil to light the Menorah, the eternal light in the Temple, for only one day. Yet somehow this small amount of oil lasted for eight days. Miracles are infused into Chanukah liturgy and practice. The letters on the dreidl, Nun, Gimel, Hey, Shin, stand for "Nes Gadol Hayah Sham — DI — a great miracle happened there."

The additions to the Amidah for Chanukah are called "Al HaNisim – על – for the miracles." The Chanukah blessing reads "SheAsah Nisim Lavoteinu... – שעשה נסים לאבותינו – Blessed is G-d... who performed miracles for our ancestors." The rabbis of the Talmud told the story of Chanukah; בעשה בו נס והדליקו ממנו שמונה ימים – na'aseh nes v'hadliko mimenu shmoneh yamim – a miracle took place, and from the oil the menorah was lit for eight days. We celebrate Chanukah, remembering these miracles that G-d provided for the Jewish people.

The Torah is replete with miracles: Moses parted the Red Sea; manna came down from the heavens to sustain the Israelites in the wilderness, and the burning bush was not consumed by fire. In modernity, we understand miracles to be the violations of the laws of nature — events that take place but should not be possible. How are we to understand miracles today? Amidst a rising tide of global antisemitism, a heinous act of terrorism against Israel, and a brutal war in Israel, what might be the role of miracles? Can we expect G-d to have an active hand now, in this time of need for the Jewish people, as G-d did for the Maccabees?

For most liberal Jews, we understand the universe to be an ordered place. While there is much that science still cannot explain, what we do understand makes sense to us. Yet we can still learn from the miraculous

and supernatural. As we light the Chanukah candles, we remember the miracle of the oil. We relive this miraculous event, lighting candles for 8 days. We feel a sense of joy and hope on Chanukah, gathering around the flickering lights of the Chanukiyah, exchanging gifts with loved ones, and singing familiar tunes.



Chanukah can bring us light and hope this year, in the midst of a scary world for the Jewish people. We

can remember the many periods throughout history when the Jewish people were attacked, but always we survived and persisted. Perhaps our very existence is a miracle: the presence of G-d and the resolve of the Jewish people. Despite millennia of persecution, Am Yisrael Chai – שראל היי – the people Israel live. Come celebrate hope and light with us this year at TBA, first on Friday, December 8, at 6:30pm for a Shabbat Chanukah service with our Hall'lu band, choir, and religious school students singing, and then for a joyous Chanukah party on Sunday, December 10, at 11am!

Lifelong Learning with Rabbi Blumberg

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
