HAPPY ADAR... AGAIN?!?

This year is special in that it's a leap year both on our Gregorian calendar, as we just saw our first February 29 since 2020— AND it's a leap year on the Hebrew calendar, as we'll begin Adar II, also known as Adar Bet or Adar Sheni (Second Adar), on the evening of March 9. But in contrast to the "leap" on the Gregorian calendar that adds one day every four years, the "leap" on our Hebrew calendar adds a whole MONTH during a leap year.

A few months ago I wrote about the complexities of our lunisolar Hebrew calendar. There I focused on the fact that some months have 29 days and others have 30, which led us to begin celebrating

two-day holidays. (I won't rehash the whole column here, but you can see the <u>September 2023 issue of Tebeam</u> to read it again.) I also alluded to the fact that every seven out of nineteen years we have two months of Adar, because "that's what keeps the holidays from moving too far."

Our holidays are thematically linked to specific times of the year: Rosh Hashanah in the early fall, as the leaves begin to turn and drop from the trees; Passover in the spring, when rebirth and renewal surround us; Chanukah in the winter, so we can bring light in the darkest time of the year. Our months change according the moon, but if we utilized a purely lunar calendar, we would find the holidays shifting back 10 days each year, such that Passover would eventually be celebrated in winter. We can't have that!

So the sages devised a calendar that would allow us to, as the Torah teaches us, use the moon as our guide for new months, while still keeping the holidays in the correct seasons. And so, by inserting an extra month of Adar every three or so years, we keep the holidays aligned with the season in which they're meant to be commemorated. Depending on how recently we've had a leap year, the High Holidays can sometimes feel "early" or "late," though, of course, they're always on time!

During a Hebrew leap year, when a birthday is celebrated or a yahrzeit is commemorated in Adar, Adar I becomes the "leap month" and the event occurs in Adar II. Our sages taught that "when Adar begins, our joy increases," and on a leap year—you guessed it!— this is true for Adar II, when we also celebrate Purim.

In the world in which we live, which is darkened by the grim reality of war and destruction, the mandate of joyous living during the month of Adar reminds us that there is always hope. We remember the many generations of our ancestors who faced great difficulty and sadness, but always yearned for a better tomorrow. We remember the instruction of Jewish living from Psalm 100 that guides us: "Worship G-d in joy."

I am grateful each and every day for our community who gather in our varied ways to embrace one another, to hold onto joy wherever we can find it, and who bring our full selves to our worship of G-d, who has been our comfort and our strength in every generation.

learning about Hebrew and Judaism, and best of all, I have an opportunity to share what I have learned.

I am teaching Hebrew to a group of very focused TBA adult members who, though a bit older than 13, have decided that the time is right to learn Hebrew and to learn to read Torah. After all, I am usually not busy on Monday nights, so why not? In fact, it has become a highlight of each week for me.

We began from the very beginning—that I have heard is a very good place to start! First, they had to learn to read Hebrew without looking at the transliterations helpfully provided by our siddur. With that behind us, and with guidance from Rabbi Blumberg and Cantor Wolff, my class has begun learning to read or chant the Shabbat morning prayers, as they will become B'nai Torah on Saturday morning, June 15. They have each been assigned a Torah portion of three verses, they are each beginning to write brief sermons, and they have studied the text of their Torah portions with Rabbi Blumberg, so that they can develop a fuller understanding. They will invite family and friends—and YOU—to enjoy their success.

What surprised me about this project is how much I have enjoyed it. I forgot how much I loved Hebrew and how good it feels to bring others into learning not just the language, but to the appreciation of the ability Biblical Hebrew has to set a mood and explain the interactions of humans with each other, and with God. What we read in Torah still has so much to teach us, in 2024 (or 5784), about how to solve problems, relate to each other, and to our community.

I look forward to every Monday night and to each private half-hour session to polish up individual Torah portions. I admit I feel proud of

each of my students, not just that they are learning so well, but because they, too, are discovering the beauty of Hebrew, even as they might struggle over an odd consonant/vowel combination.

Additionally, they have embarked on a project to design and make their own tallit, and from what I have observed, this will be absolutely amazing to see on the bima. So I am giving you advance notice. Please mark your calendars and join this wonderful B'nai Torah class on June 15 and help us all kvell a little or even a lot!

Purim, Celebration, and Anti-Semitism

Following the horrific attack by Hamas on Israel on October 7, 2023, we are painfully aware of the global uptick in anti-Semitism. We know of anti-Semitic acts taking place both locally and globally. And we know that throughout history there have been many instances of hatred towards Jewish people, going back more than 2,000 years. In every case, the Jewish people survived and persisted. And so many of us have been saying *Am Yisrael Chai* יים אור שראל דיים these last few months, meaning "the people of Israel live."

The story of Purim is a story of Jewish triumph over anti-Semitism, and of the ascen-

dancy of a Jewish minority. At the end of the Purim story, the book of Esther tells us that "Mordecai the Jew ranked next to King Achashverosh and was highly regarded by the Jews, and popular with the multitude of his brethren." Throughout history, Jews have been a visible minority in a majority that was often not friendly to Jewish people. The notable exception is, of course, modern Israel, where 73% of the population is Jewish. The Purim story, while not exactly historical, is a story of hope for the Jewish people, that even as a minority, Jews can be safe, visible, and part of greater society.

The Purim story is not for the faint of heart. Haman (boo!) utters a classical description of anti-Semitism: "there is a certain people, scattered and dispersed among the other peoples in all the provinces, whose laws are different, and who do not obey the king's laws; and it is not in the King's interest to tolerate them." Based on Haman's words, "written instructions were dispatched by couriers to all the King's provinces to destroy, massacre, and exterminate all the Jews, young and old, children and women, on a single day, the thirteenth day of Adar—and to plunder their possessions." Haman calls for the utter destruction of the Jewish people in Persia. It is a harrowing story, similar, unfortunately, to real events throughout history.

Yet, curiously, Purim is a holiday beloved by children, and a holiday on which we celebrate raucously. We can imagine Jews in medieval Spain, living through the horrors of the Spanish Inquisition, or Jews in Eastern Europe, faced with the threat of pogroms. In the face of real danger, Purim was a time for these communities to let loose – to make light of the reality of anti-Semitism, and to celebrate Jewish triumph over hatred. For those Jewish communities, and for us, Purim teaches how to combat fear and hatred with celebration and irreverence.

This year, we desperately need celebration and irreverence in the face of fear and hatred. And so Temple Beth Am will celebrate Purim with a very silly retelling of the Purim story, *The Little Mermaideleh*, a Purim parody based on *The Little Mermaid*. The Purim Spiel and Megillah reading will take place Sunday, March 24, at 10 AM. We hope to see you there, to help us celebrate hope for the future of the Jewish people, and to combat darkness with silliness!

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



Temple Beth Am's scholarships were established by members of our congregation to assist our temple youth in enriching their Jewish foundation and experiences.

Leslie Brenner Camp Scholarship Fund: assists Temple Beth Am youth attending Jewish youth enrichment programs. Must send application directly to Sisterhood, sisterhoodtba300@gmail.com.

Mindy Steinberg Memorial Fund: helps finance a Confirmation class graduate's first time traveling to Israel and whose families are temple members in good standing. This includes the URJ High School semester in Israel.

David Mindess Scholarship Fund: supports high school graduating seniors whose families are temple members in good standing. This is a one-year assistance opportunity.

Gail H. Constant Memorial Fund: provides a \$500 scholarship annually to a Temple Beth Am graduating senior who is planning a career path in art/design or fashion marketing. Under the conditions of this fund, graduating seniors must apply at least 60 days prior to the deadline.
