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A Word from Rabbi Blumberg

What's on Your Summer Reading List?



Each summer when we head to California to visit my family, I pack four or five books I've been looking forward to reading. It's aspirational; rarely do I get through more than half a book as our time is chock-full of fun and energetic chaotic family time. In the spirit of honoring the Jewish value of *limmud*—lifelong learning— and these longer days which invite us to make the most of them, I want to share with you a few of the books I've read recently.

I offer gratitude to those congregants who have suggested or lent a book. If you read or have read one of these books, or have other book suggestions of Jewish titles you've read recently, let me know and let's talk about it!

Rav Kook: Mystic in a Time of Revolution by Yehudah Mirsky

In the period when secular Zionism reigned, Rabbi Abraham Isaac Kook (1865-1935) is credited for creating a religious framework for Zionism which allowed observant Jews to reconcile settlement of the Land of Israel with the previous notion that only God could bring about its future full resettlement. Rav Kook encouraged observant Jews to embrace and participate in the Zionist project and served as the first Chief Rabbi of British Mandatory Palestine before his death. This biography tells of the arc of Rav Kook's life, his seminal and often controversial teachings, and his deep convictions which laid the groundwork for the rise of the Religious Zionist movement, active as both a religious and political movement in Israel today.

The Last Jews of Kerala by Edna Fernandes

For 2,000 years there existed a vibrant Jewish community in Kerala, on the southwestern tip of India. The author immersed herself in the community and interviewed its diminishing population as intermarriage and emigration to Israel increased. Fernandes tells of the rivalry between the "White Jews" who were largely Sephardic arrivals who came after the 1492 Spanish expulsion, and the "Black Jews" who were the older, longer-established community. Their rivalry involved social hierarchy and status, leading to fractures in the Jewish community. This book is a fascinating study of a Jewish population that once was, and the impact the State of Israel made on smaller Jewish communities abroad.

Heart of a Stranger by Angela Buchdahl

Rabbi Angela Buchdahl is the Senior Rabbi of Central Synagogue in New York City, and in this touching book she weaves beautiful interpretations of Torah into memories of her life. Born to a Jewish father and a Korean mother, Rabbi Buchdahl writes about the pains and triumphs of finding her footing in the Jewish community. She challenges notions of what it means to be an "insider" and an "outsider," offering insights for us, too, about how we can continue to build inclusive, loving Jewish community.

When We See You Again by Rachel Goldberg-Polin

This heart-wrenching narrative, written by Hersh's mother after her son was— in her words— 'stolen' on October 7 and murdered nearly a year later in Gaza, turns its readers into holy witnesses of the unrelenting torment she endured, and the incredible lengths she went as she worked to bring back Hersh and all those taken hostage on October 7. Her writing gives the impression of unfiltered, sacred catharsis— a front-row seat to a nightmare no parent wants to imagine but we were all privy to day by day until the final hostage came home.

We also blessed our rising 7th graders, as they become B'nai Mitzvah and graduate from lower school. It was a joyous and fun day for our students, and somewhat bittersweet for our teachers, as students we have taught for many years depart the TBA Lower School!

That same weekend, we celebrated our amazing TBA teachers and madrichim with Education Shabbat on Friday, May 15. Students helped to sing the opening and closing songs in our service, with several students singing solos in Debbie Friedman's beautiful interpretation of Joel 3:1, singing "Now I'm grown, the years have passed, I've come to understand...there are choices to be made, and my life's at my command. I cannot have a future 'til I embrace my past. I promise to pursue the challenge, time is going fast." The service was followed by a festive ice cream Oneg.

This year in our religious school has truly been a blessing. We welcomed 7 brand new students to our growing religious school (with more new students slated to join us next year). We welcomed 2 amazing new teachers and welcomed back some beloved members of our religious school staff and community.

Our students engaged meaningfully with some long-standing celebrations in our TBA lower school – like our Tu Bishvat Seder during which students tasted special foods from Israel, and discussed how to support the trees on our planet. And our students engaged in some exciting, new projects, like making shiva baskets to support mourners in our community (see the photo in this issue of TeBeAm).

Our Wednesday religious school students (grades 3-6) took on a new challenge this year - learning modern Hebrew on Wednesdays! Students learned pronouns, how to have basic conversations, how to talk about holidays, and more, and began to understand that Hebrew is not just the ancient language we use for our prayers; it is also a vibrant, living language,

"How I support Israel" — personal reflections on ways our community members support Israel and its people

Merle Kushner- I support NATAL:

NATAL, meaning to lift up or carry, is Israel's leading trauma-focused organization, providing comprehensive services to individuals, families, and communities impacted by war, terror, and violence.

Israel has been navigating continuously, what NATAL's Chief Psychologist Dr. Boaz Shalgi has coined, "rolling trauma," defined by the unrelenting multiplicity of ongoing events. (From Mayaan Aviv, head of American Friends of NATAL, [the Jewish Standard](#) 12 16 25 "Collective Healing is the Foundation for Israeli Resilience").

I have chosen to highlight the work of NATAL because of my career as a social worker and long professional relationship and friendship with a woman who lived and worked for many years in Israel, returns regularly, and told me about NATAL. I had asked her for a recommendation for what organization I could support in the aftermath of October 7. NATAL's framework embraces and elevates mental health, survivorship, the capacity to hold multiple viewpoints, intercultural work, and collective healing.

Services include

- A 24/7 trauma helpline
- Individual therapy, group support, and specialized treatment programs serving over 3,000 patients weekly
- Community Resilience Programs
- Trauma-Informed Career Services
- A Research and Innovation Unit contributing to the global understanding of trauma treatment and recovery
- Public Education Campaigns
- Specialized training to professionals, including first responders, educators, and healthcare workers

NATAL ensures that all Israelis affected by trauma receive the expert care they need to build resilience and reclaim their lives.

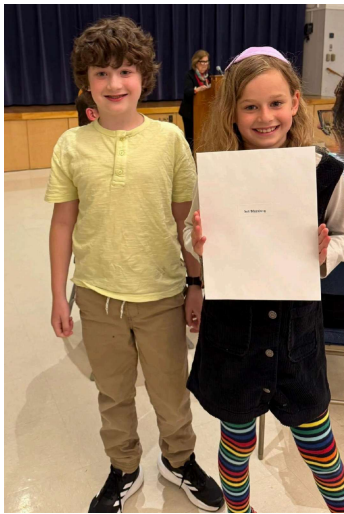
